#### 63. TOXOCARIASIS

#### What?

- Toxocariasis (also called Toxocara) is a rare infection caused by roundworm parasites which live in the faeces of dogs, cats and foxes.
- Humans can catch it from handling soil or sand contaminated with infected animal faeces. Humans become infected if contaminated soil comes in contact with their mouths.
- Cases have been reported in people of all ages but are especially prevalent in young children.



### Why?



- For most people, an infection with these roundworm larvae causes no symptoms and the parasite die within months.
- However, some people experience mild symptoms such as a cough, high temperature above 38C, headaches or stomach pains.
- In rare cases the roundworm larvae affects the organs such as liver, lungs, eyes or brain and can cause symptoms such as: loss of appetite, skin rashes, difficulty breathing, seizures, painful red eye or blurred and cloudy vision, usually effecting just one eye. There's a risk of permanent vision loss, but prompt treatment can reduce the chances of this happening.

### Do 🎺

- ✓ Practice good hygiene to avoid contamination
- Wash hands with soap and warm water thoroughly for 20 seconds after handling pets or coming in to contact with soil and sand
- Wear gloves at all times when handling soil and sand
- Wash hands even when gloves have been worn
- See your GP as soon as possible if you think you have symptoms that may be caused by toxocariasis

## Don't X

- Don't eat food, smoke or touch your mouth before washing hands
- Don't eat food grown in soil without washing it well
- Don't work near cat and dog faeces tell your group leader
- Don't pick up faeces when litter picking.
