

Harrogate District

Fewston Reservoir

Car park (with height barrier) off the A59 at Blubberhouses or at Swinsty Reservoir (see page 5).

Ramped access to the reservoir path and good surfacing. We've assisted manual wheelchair users around the entire reservoir (4 miles) but the steep gradients in some areas make it tough going! You might like to try the easier going walk around the adjacent Swinsty Reservoir instead. Blue Badge holders can avoid parking charges by applying for the annual parking permit online: https://yorkshirewater.zatpermit.com/applicant.

Millennium Green, Pateley Bridge





Park in the Nidderdale Showground car park off the B6265. www.opencountry.org.uk/breakfree

In the heart of Nidderdale, this 1-mile walk (with optional diversions around the green) explores a nice open space on the edge of the town. From the showground car park cross over the bridge and turn left up Millfield Street, continue along here and turn left into The Sidings and keep on this path up to Millennium Green. You can make a circular walk by crossing the Nidd and returning to Pateley Bridge along the river. The paths are made of crushed stone, with regular resting points. Accessible toilets are located at the recreation ground near to the zebra crossing (RADAR key required).

Nidderdale Greenway

Start at the ASDA car park off Dragon Road, Harrogate. www.sustrans.org.uk/ncn/map/route/harrogate-to-ripley





A 4-mile traffic free route linking Harrogate with Ripley. The route is on a fantastic converted railway line crossing the River Nidd on the Grade 2 listed Nidd Viaduct. The path has a tarmac surface and is mostly flat and suitable for wheelchair users, though there are a couple of hilly sections on the outskirts of Ripley. Accessible toilets at Ripley car park (RADAR key required). From Ripley, a one-mile extension runs to Clint along the historic Hollybank Lane; this is a tarmac path but it is quite hilly in places. Ripley village has shops, cafés and ice cream.

Pateley Bridge to Glasshouses

Park in the Nidderdale Showground car park off the B6265. www.opencountry.org.uk/breakfree





A flat, firm, wheelchair accessible, riverside trail (2½ miles there and back) enables everyone to enjoy the history and natural beauty of this part of Nidderdale. For a leaflet, contact Open Country on 01423 507227. There is Blue Badge parking in the Nidderdale Showground car park off the B6265 and accessible toilets across the road in the recreation ground near to the zebra crossing (RADAR key required). The walk starts at the public footpath sign by the bridge.

Ripon Canal Walk

Starts at the canal basin, off the B6265 (Bondgate Green).



A linear walk on a flat, surfaced path (though it can be a little rough in places where the tarmac has cracked); almost 4 miles there and back. A great chance to see lots of birdlife and watercraft as you follow the canal. Near to the marina there are two bird screens which look over the wetlands. Beyond Nicholsons Bridge the path becomes rougher and grassy and may not be negotiable for everyone, especially in wet weather. If you decide to carry on, you can access Ripon City Wetlands (see 'Accessible Wildlife Sites' – page 46) further up the path and visit a bird hide just before the next bridge. Nearest accessible toilets are by Ripon Bus Station, off Moss Arcade (RADAR key required).

Scar House Reservoir

Car park at the end of the private road from Lofthouse www.opencountry.org.uk/breakfree





A Yorkshire Water site near Middlesmoor, north of Pateley Bridge. Set amid the wildest part of Nidderdale with spectacular scenery. Three sides of the reservoir are tarmac. Accessible toilets (RADAR key required), picnic area and seasonal refreshment kiosk at the car park. More details available from our Harrogate District Breakfree trail pack; link above.

Swinsty Reservoir

A 3-mile circular walk around the Yorkshire Water reservoir in the beautiful Washburn Valley. Paths are made of crushed stone and are fairly level, though there is a steep section leading up to the road on the east end of the dam. Blue Badge parking, accessible toilets (RADAR key required), picnic tables and often an ice cream van are located at Swinsty Moor car park, off North Lane. More details available from our Harrogate District Breakfree trail pack; link above. Blue Badge holders can avoid parking charges by applying for the annual parking permit online: https://yorkshirewater.zatpermit.com/applicant

The Coldstones Cut

Toft Gate car park is off the B6265, 2 miles west of Pateley Bridge. www.thecoldstonescut.org

A stupendous open-air sculpture perched 418 metres above sea level. On a clear day, views of over 60km are revealed. Starting from the car park, a 500m long signposted walk leads to the monument via a crushed stone path with accessible gates. It is a short but <u>very</u> steep walk. We have taken manual wheelchair users up there but it should not be attempted lightly! The nearest accessible toilets are in Pateley Bridge recreation ground near to the zebra crossing (RADAR key required).

Valley Gardens Walk, Harrogate

A pretty, accessible point to point walk of around 1¼ miles through the Valley Gardens, Pinewoods and onto Harlow Carr Gardens. Our Harrogate District Breakfree trails have details of the walk; see link above. RHS Harlow Carr have produced a leaflet describing this walk in detail which is available on their website or in the gardens themselves:

- Valley Gardens (section 1): This ¾ mile section takes you through the lovely Valley Gardens in Harrogate. Start at the corner of Valley Drive opposite the Pump Room Museum. The gardens have accessible toilets (RADAR key required) and a café. Blue Badge parking spaces along Cornwall Road, Valley Drive and Harlow Moor Drive. Paths are smooth tarmac but at times fairly steep.
- **The Pinewoods** (section 2): This ½ mile section is joined from the Valley Gardens by walking straight across Harlow Moor Road (signposted to `RHS Harlow Carr). The tarmac path takes you through woodland past a binocular viewpoint until you reach Crag Lane near the entrance to Harlow Carr (see 'Outings' page 15).

Dales Area

Aysgarth Falls and Freeholders Wood

Across the road from the National Park Centre, a level footpath runs through Freeholders' Wood with great views of the Middle Falls. You cannot access Lower Falls in a wheelchair. All gates are accessible and there are seating areas along the route. The visitor centre has a café, shop and accessible toilets (RADAR key required).

Buckden

Off the B6160 at Buckden, north of Kettlewell. www.opencountry.org.uk/breakfree





A walk approximately 1 mile each way which follows the River Wharfe from Buckden to Hubberholme. The route starts off Dubb's Lane; after the bridge, go through a gate on your right and follow the crushed stone path. In some areas, the path narrows due to encroaching vegetation. As you approach Hubberholme, you can either continue on the wide gravel path to avoid traffic, or turn off to the left and carry on along the road; which is fairly quiet. Details of the route can be downloaded from our website above, following the link for our Wild about Wharfedale Breakfree trail. There are accessible toilets (RADAR key required) and Blue Badge parking in the National Park car park. The village shop sells refreshments.

Burnsall Riverside Walk

This ½ mile walk beside the River Wharfe starts by the bridge, next to the pub. Two accessible gates might be too tight for larger electric wheelchairs, but otherwise the route is flat and level. Details of the route can be downloaded from our website above, following the link for our Wild about Wharfedale pack. Pay & display car park near to the start of the walk (off the B6160), with accessible toilets and a refreshment kiosk.

Cotter Force

2 miles from Hawes on the A684 towards Sedbergh.

This attractive waterfall in a beautiful setting has a reasonably level path, around 400m long, with ramps alongside the beck suitable for wheelchair users. Park at the layby just before the bridge; from here a path leads to the waterfall. Accessible toilets (RADAR key required) at the Dales Countryside Museum car park on Burtersett Road in Hawes.

Grimwith Reservoir

4.5 miles east of Grassington, off the B6265; follow the access road to the car park.

Open views over the reservoir and surrounding moors. If wheelchair users can be sure of negotiating the steep section down to the heather thatched barn, then a stone track can be followed for almost two miles. More robust mobility scooters will be able to make it around the whole reservoir (4½ miles). Free parking and accessible toilets (RADAR key required).

Ingleborough Estate Nature Trail

Near Clapham Village, the trail passes through lovely woodland on the way to Ingleborough Cave (see 'Outdoor Pursuits' – page 25). 1.3 miles each way, the trail is steep, stony and muddy in parts, being too steep for self-propelling wheelchair users. A powered mobility scooter will negotiate the trail and can be pre-booked on the number above. Car park and accessible toilets (RADAR key required) at Clapham Village, around ½ mile away. There is a small entry charge for the trail which is open daily.

Leeds & Liverpool Canal, Gargrave


A short ½ mile walk, beginning by the A65 at Gargrave. The surface between bridges 169A and 169 is good. The adjacent 'Anchor Inn' pub is accessible and has an accessible toilet (for customer use). Alternatively, there are public toilets on the corner of South Street and the High Street in Gargrave.

Leyburn Shawl

Leyburn centre has plenty of parking and accessible toilets at the bottom end of Market Place. The Shawl Walk, accessed from Shawl Terrace, only goes through two tiny fields, but offers a great viewpoint over Wensleydale. There is a bench and an information board.

Accessed from Mill Bridge, you can follow the beck for a short distance with great views of the castle walls, though steps will prevent wheelchair users from continuing onto the woods. Apart from a slight incline at the beginning, the path through the mature woodland is fairly level and follows Eller Beck, past Round Dam and alongside Long Dam. Beyond here the path gets rougher. Parking and accessible toilets (RADAR key required) are off the High Street on Jerry Croft.

The Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority have produced a number of 'Miles Without Stiles' route cards detailing walks in the Dales suitable for wheelchairs, buggies or those who can't negotiate stiles easily. The routes can be downloaded from their website or purchased from the National Park Centres (at Aysgarth Falls, Grassington, Hawes or Malham) or from their online shop.

York & Selby Area

Brayton Barff Woods

A 1.3 mile circular walk around ancient woodland; a great spot for bird watching and spring bluebells. The stone footpath undulates and has steep sections, but is suitable for wheelchair users. Visitors should be aware of adverse camber and tree roots in places. Car park off Barff Lane, though a height barrier will prevent larger vehicles from entering. Leaflet available from Yorkshire Water or download it from the website above.

Rawcliffe Meadows

A 2-mile linear walk on a good, level tarmac path through ancient flood meadows, hosting a wealth of wild flowers in summer. Access is from Rawcliffe Bar Park & Ride (accessible toilets and plenty of Blue Badge parking) at one end, or the Museum Gardens in York at the other end (Blue Badge parking at the nearby Marygate car park).

In the heart of the North York Moors National Park, Dalby Forest offers many walking and cycling trails. There are several easy access routes in the forest including the Ellerburn Trail, Crosscliff View Trail, Lakeside Trail and Waitcliff Trail. Mobility scooters are available for hire by visitors; please book in advance. The visitor centre has level access, an accessible toilet and a hearing loop. You can enjoy a 9-mile drive through the forest with walks and picnic stops.

Esk Valley to Beck Hole

2 miles from Egton Bridge, the walk starts at a gate by the parking area. www.northyorkmoors.org.uk

A linear route of 3 miles (there and back). A fantastic outing, along a section of disused railway line, in the company of the tumbling Murk Esk.











The path has a compact, hard surface and is fairly level, though there is a slight uphill gradient from the old railway line into Beck Hole. You can download the walk route from the website above. Accessible toilets at Goathland and Grosmont Stations.

Starts at the small, lower car park, almost at the top of Chimney Bank. Linear route of 1% miles (there and back) along the old railway line and past disused ironstone kilns. The end of the route has seating and great views across the moors. Accessible toilets at Rosedale Abbey.

Sutton Bank & the White Horse

Spectacular escarpment with panoramic views over the Vales of York and Mowbray. The 1½ mile linear crushed stone path takes you to the top of the most northerly White Horse in England, allowing you to savour one of the finest views in the country. NB: Unfenced cliff path in places. A longer 5¼ mile 'Easy Access' circular route carries on from the White Horse and takes in part of the Sutton Bank Cliff cycle route, which winds through the woods and across fields. There are no stiles or gates, but it is rough in places, so is suited to more robust motorised wheelchairs. Another option is the wheelchair accessible Cliff Plantation and Viewpoint Trail which starts by the car park and takes you through heathland to a view point over Goremire Lake. Tearoom, shop and visitor centre are fully accessible. Electric scooter and manual wheelchairs available for use around the site. An accessible toilet and a Changing Places Toilet are located near to the visitor centre.



Thornton-le-Dale

A 200m circular route around the village duck pond which has been designed to attract wildlife. The Lakeside car park (off Maltongate) has level access to the rest of the village (with shops and cafés) and an accessible toilet (RADAR key required).

A National Trust reserve with fascinating rock formations and excellent views of the surrounding countryside and heather moorland. Over 700m of paths provide a walk suitable for most wheelchair users, although it is rough in parts and a strong pusher is advised. A map of the recommended accessible routes is available. Accessible toilets, refreshment kiosk and picnic tables are located at the top of the main track. There is a drop-off/pick-up point close to the kiosk; this can be arranged with the staff in the car park. Two tramper style mobility scooters are available for loan for free by prior arrangement. Braille and large print guides available.

Druid's Temple

Access is off Knowle Lane, north of Ilton.



This 19th century folly, situated in the middle of a pine forest, was created by William Danby and features an oval of altars, menhirs, dolmens and sarsens leading to a temple. Parking is a short distance away at the Bivouac café, where there is an accessible toilet (for customers), parking charges apply. From here you follow the stony track and then a stone/grassy path to the temple. Other paths around the woodland are rougher and undulating.

Fountains Abbey is the largest monastic ruin in Britain. A World Heritage Site; no other site in Europe contains such a rich variety of historic monuments in a beautiful landscape. There is no wheelchair access from the visitor centre to the abbey, but a wheelchair accessible minibus runs a ferry service to the valley floor. Alternatively, the Westgate car park and entrance are recommended for wheelchair users as there is level access and a shorter walk to the Abbey and water gardens. Manual wheelchairs and mobility scooters are available to borrow – please call to book first.

Due to the terrain, 3-wheeled scooters are not permitted. The Abbey Mill has level access and a lift. Level access into the abbey, though it is over lawn in parts. Free entry for essential carers.





A range of cycle routes graded for different abilities. The Ellerburn Trail (2.8 miles) is a multi-user pathway for disabled cyclists, walkers, and wheelchair users, taking in beautiful views along the valley. Parking charges apply to vehicles. See 'Easy Going Walks' - page 10.

Greenfield Forest

Park off the road at Beckermonds, which lies between Buckden and Oughtershaw in Langstrothdale Chase.

A 5-mile linear route which ends where the trail meets the Pennine Way. The surface is tarmac and gravel and can be rough in places. Gradients undulating. Cattle grids.

The 4-mile route incorporates a river, a viaduct, a castle, a cave and ice creams! Steep in parts. The route starts on Abbey Road near St. James Retail Park in Knaresborough. The eastern half from Knaresborough to Bilton is known as the Beryl Burton Cycleway, named after the local cycling legend who won seven world championships and 96 national titles. Accessible toilets in Knaresborough & Starbeck. You can join up with the Nidderdale Greenway at the end of the ride in Bilton (see below) and extend your ride to Ripley.

A 4-mile traffic free route linking Ripley with Harrogate (and onto Starbeck & Knaresborough if you join Route 636 above). The route is wheelchair accessible and is on a fantastic converted railway line crossing the River Nidd on the Grade 2 listed Nidd Viaduct. Accessible toilets at Ripley car park (where the route begins). From Ripley, a one mile extension runs to Clint along the historic Hollybank Lane.

Scarborough to Whitby - NCN Route 1

Up to 20 miles point to point following the old Scarborough to Whitby Railway, axed in 1965. The spectacular North Yorkshire Heritage Coast has many highlights, including the magnificent 13 arch Larpool Viaduct at Whitby. You can start in Station Road Scalby, or Burniston, Ravenscar, Robin Hoods Bay, Hawsker and Whitby. The surface is variable – gravel, but stony and rutted in parts. NB: vehicles and horses use the route in places and there are several minor road crossings. Download a Trailways leaflet from the website above.

Selby Canal - NCN Route 65

The stretch from Bawtry Road Bridge to Burn Bridge (2 miles) is open to cyclists. Parking available by the Selby Canal, just off Brayton Lane.

Selby to Howdon - NCN Route 65

Starting from Selby Swing Bridge, a 3-mile off road route meanders past industrial units and along the flood bank to Cliffe, with a partially on-road extension to Howden, a further 8 miles. The route is rutted in places and would not be suitable for wheelchair users, though our Selby disability tandem club have ridden on it and say it is 'passable' on their tandems. Details of the route can be found on the TPT website.



Spofforth to Wetherby (The Harland Way) - NCN Route 67


A 3½ mile route along an old railway tack. The start is off East Park Road in Spofforth. Links with the Wetherby to Thorp Arch route; see below. Accessible toilets (RADAR key required) on The Shambles in Wetherby.

Mostly flat surfaces of crushed stone or tarmac. Most of the route is along what used to be the East Coast Main Line Railway. There is a delightful sculpture trail based on the solar system. Askham Bog

This reserve lies next to the A64 south of York, and is one of the oldest and most prestigious reserves belonging to the Yorkshire Wildlife Trust. It is renowned for its ancient relict fen and bog flora and fauna. A board walk gives a circular walk around the reserve suitable for wheelchair users and there is an accessible pond dipping platform. There are permissive footpaths across the reserve, though wellies are advised in the winter months as it can get very wet and boggy. The nearest accessible toilets are at Askham Bar Park and Ride ½ mile away.

Barlow Common Nature Reserve

Barlow Road, Barlow, YO8 8E Off the A1041 Selby to Snaith road.

The reserve contains a mosaic of habitats including mature woodland,

wetland areas and wildflower meadows. It is great for butterflies during the summer, and there is a good chance you will see or hear a green woodpecker! Most paths around the reserve are suitable for wheelchair users. Disabled parking is accessed via Barlow Common Road; alternatively, you can park in the main car park off Barlow Road and stroll along the level path to the nature reserve, though an 'A' frame motorcycle barrier may prevent larger mobility scooters from entering at this end.

Barmby on the Marsh Wetlands



A small wetland nature reserve, located at the meeting point between the River Derwent and River Ouse and at the very southern tip of the Lower Derwent Valley (LDV) National Nature Reserve. The reserve is a Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI), designated for its importance for wildfowl and lowland waders. Accessed via the end of the High Street, Barmby on the Marsh. Accessible toilets, picnic tables and Blue Badge bays in the car park and benches along the way. A tarmac path from the car park takes you across the tidal barrage to a fence line with viewing slots, though they may not be easy for wheelchair users to see through. At the time of visiting there were plans to build a new bird viewing screen/hide. Watch this space!

Bolton-on-Swale Lake Nature Reserve

A large lake attracting a wide range of breeding and wintering waders and wildfowl. There is a small car park and an accessible bird hide and screen reached by a surfaced path, though the grass has encroached making it narrow in places. When we visited, the access lane was unsigned and very rough, so low floor vehicles should take care. Accessible toilets 6 miles away at The Station, Station Yard, Richmond, DL10 4LD.

Burton Riggs

The reserve car park is situated just off the A64, south of Scarborough and close to Seamer village, on the opposite side of the roundabout to the supermarket. At the southern end of the car park a footpath leads under the road onto the reserve. The old sand and gravel workings are a haven for wetland birds, especially during migration. There is a wheelchair accessible route around the smaller lake.

Colt House Bridge Car Park and Viewing Area

This viewing platform overlooking Gouthwaite Reservoir near Pateley Bridge offers a great chance to see birds of prey and waterfowl.

Farndale Nature Reserve

In spring you can enjoy the sights of thousands of native wild daffodils along the River Dove and surrounding meadows. The path is suitable for wheelchair users from the car park at Low Mill (though there is a relatively steep slope at the beginning of the path) to a small pond part way along. Following on, a linear route is about 1 mile there and back. The path leads you to a café and pub (as does the nearby country road). There is an accessible toilet (RADAR key required) at Low Mill car park and a mobile information point during the daffodil season.

Filey Dams Nature Reserve

The last remaining freshwater marsh of any size in the area, providing a resting place for large numbers of migrant waders and wildfowl. The car

park is accessed via Wharfedale, off the A1039 Muston Road. Wheelchair access to the main hide only. Accessible toilets on Royal Parade, Filey.

A magical nature reserve adjacent to Catterick Garrison. There is an unparalleled range of wildlife habitats, accessible screens and hides and a superb Field Centre to warm up in, with an indoor bird viewing area, tea making facilities, and accessible toilets. Many of the paths are made of compacted gravel and suitable for wheelchair users, with boardwalks over the wetter areas; ask at the centre for recommended routes. For security reasons you need to show photographic ID on entry to the barracks and collect a pass.

High Batts Nature Reserve

The reserve has one small hide, the ground floor of which is accessible. Access is for members only or by special arrangement, as High Batts is a private nature reserve. It comprises some 12.5 ha of mixed woodland following the River Ure. Mainly grassy paths that may be suitable for wheelchair users with a strong pusher in dry weather. The reserve can only be reached by your own vehicle along a rough, working path.

Killinghall Low Bridge

Off the A61 Harrogate to Ripon road.

This old bridge is a great place to sit, watch and listen for bats.


A huge natural limestone cliff, situated to the north of Malham in the Yorkshire Dales National Park. A surfaced track runs from the top of Malham Village to the base of the Cove; the walk on the road up from the village is steep in parts. Peregrine falcons have nested at the Cove since 1993 and you may be lucky to spot them during the spring and summer months. Accessible toilets in the car park at Malham National Park Centre (RADAR key required).

Marfield Nature Reserve

Follow the A6108 towards Leyburn for 1 mile out of Masham.

Ignore the first brown tourist sign to Marfield Wetlands, as the paths and hide at this end of the reserve are not particularly wheelchair accessible. Instead, turn right down the track opposite Mile House Farm (the sign has a wheelchair symbol on). A small bird hide and screen accessed from the car park overlooks the reserve. There is a small 'lip' into the hide.

A Victorian forest garden, the great attraction for visitors is the wonderful display of daffodils, narcissi, rhododendrons and azaleas in the spring and early summer. There is limited parking on the roadside by the entrance. Nearest accessible toilets (RADAR key required) at Rawcliffe Bar Park and Ride, York, off the A1237. Can be combined with a trip to nearby Rawcliffe Meadows (see page 46).

The reserve is part of the Lower Derwent Valley National Nature Reserve and includes an accessible trail taking you alongside flood meadows which supports wintering and breeding wildfowl and waders. There is an accessible bird screen and hide along the trail. Some sections can be prone to flooding in the winter. The nearest accessible toilet is in Bank Island car park, south-east of Wheldrake, on the road to Thorganby.

Run by the Lower Ure Conservation Trust. The reserve is widely regarded as one of the best examples of wetland grassland in northern England. There are two accessible hides; the larger one is in the car park and has large glass windows and information about the reserve. A fine, gravel path leads to the Northern Viewing Screen, with plenty of benches to rest on along the way. There is also an accessible pond dipping platform.

East of the reserve on the B6267 is Nosterfield Quarry. At the entrance is a car park and small Information and Education Centre (run by Tarmac), which is open all year round to visitors and has an accessible toilet. In part a working quarry, this is also a restored haven for wildlife. There is a path from the car park leading to the water bodies and reed beds, but it is narrow and not suitable for wheelchairs.

Rawcliffe Meadows

Part of the Ouse Ings floodplain to the north of York. A site of Special Scientific Interest with wonderful wildflower displays in the spring. There is a good tarmac path through the meadows. You can access the meadows from Rawcliffe Bar Park and Ride where there are accessible toilets and plenty of Blue Badge parking.



Blue Badge holders can drive to the bird screen by the riverside lagoon (a RADAR key is needed to access the gate off the car park). Here, there is a picnic table, an accessible bird screen overlooking the lake and an audio information point. The site can be prone to flooding.

A small site with grassland, scrub and ponds rich in amphibian life, including great crested newts. An accessible pond dipping platform allows access right to the water's edge.

A section of the circular walk is accessible for wheelchairs, but the paths can become flooded in the winter. The reservoir is important for wintering wildfowl and the bird hide is accessed from the Sailing Club car park – it is about 270m to the hide. Accessible toilets in the visitor centre.

Skipwith Common National Nature Reserve

This National Nature Reserve is home to a wealth of rare plants and animals characteristic of one of the last remaining ancient lowland heathlands in the north of England. There is a 1km 'Easy Going Nature Trail' around Bomb Bays Heath. The route is level and has a hard surface, though it is uneven in places. The viewing platform is a great place to look and listen out for wildlife; you may be lucky enough to see woodcock, long-eared owls and the elusive nightjar on summer evenings. Audio information point near to the platform. No toilet facilities on site.

This superb wetland site lying close to the River Tutt holds year round interest for visitors, with regular sightings of otters and several orchid species among the highlights. There is a marvellous hexagonal hide overlooking the West Lagoon which is wheelchair accessible. Good, accessible paths around the reserve, though there are steps up to two of the hides by the East Lagoon. In addition to the car park on Minskip Road, Blue Badge parking is available close to the main hide which is accessed via Main Street, next to the church - you will need a RADAR key for the gate. Nearest accessible toilets in Back Lane car park, Boroughbridge (RADAR key required).

A former landfill site, St Nicks has been transformed into a thriving Local Nature Reserve with woodland and meadows, as well as an accessible environment centre, wildlife pond, picnic and play area. You can follow a tree trail around the site on a wheelchair accessible crushed stone path. Plenty of bird life to spot and water voles have been recorded on the reserve, though you will have to be very lucky to see one!

While some paths are wheelchair accessible, certain areas may be challenging for wheelchair users (especially in wet weather) as they are on mown grass. There is a Blue Badge parking space at the entrance to the site and a wheelchair accessible compost toilet is located near to the entrance (RADAR key required).

Entrance fee, but carers are free. Open daily from February to the end of November.



Blue Badges help people with disabilities or health conditions park closer to their destination. The scheme operates throughout the UK and is managed by local authorities, who deal with applications and issue Blue Badges.

Blue Badge holders may:

- Park as long as they wish in a disc parking zone provided that the Blue Badge is displayed.
- Park on a single or double yellow line for up to three hours provided that the Blue Badge and time disc is displayed and the vehicle causes no obstruction.
- Always check individual car parks to see if you are required to pay or not as practice differs widely.
